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Background


- Rodney Tolley visit to Timaru.
- Observation virtually no wayfinding signage in Timaru CBD.
- No pedestrian aids to finding shops, civic services, restaurants, landmarks etc
- Visitors would most likely be completely lost.
- Street name signage for drivers not walkers.
- No signs for cycling either.

- To improve walkability of Timaru CBD

 - "we will provide a transport system that promotes community prosperity"
- Contribute to LTMA objectives
- Timaru Active Transport Strategy

Scope of the Study

- Develop wayfinding system for Timaru CBD
- Provide specification/location of signage
- ENCOURAGE MORE WALKING




Get the Information Right - Fundamental Principles

- Road maps are for drivers, walkers have different needs.
- Must work for the first time user.
 - Where to look for wayfinding information
 - Understand it
 - Obtain it quickly, intuitively and without fuss
- A walker experience must be positive one.

Recommendations

- Sign family consisting of:
 - Master walking map,
 - information panels (IP's) and directional signs
- 16 (IPs) at entrance points to CBD
- 4 IPs at the entrance to the heart of the commercial/retail Activity Centre
- Additional Street name signage for walkers.
- Walking Times shown on map and IP's
